#### overview

#### Thank you for downloading the *Both-And* Study Guide.

- This Guide will help you lead a group through the book's content, chapter by chapter.
- It can be used for personal reflection, but is primarily designed for leading group study.
- The group will require access to the book (one chapter to be read between meetings).
- If possible, ask the group to read the book's introduction before the first meeting.
- During the first meeting, follow the five steps on the next page.
- For all subsequent meetings, simply go to the relevant chapter in this Guide, and follow the steps on-page.

## Prayer for Revelation

If the group members are not already familiar with each other at the first meeting, you may like to ask them to briefly introduce themselves.

Specifically highlighting any previous learning or background in theology may be helpful in gaining a basic picture of where everyone is at in their thinking.

Before the first meeting, you will have ideally read the whole book; or, at least, read enough chapters to understand how the 'both-and' concept works in principle.

Find out whether everyone in the group has been able to read the introduction to the book. Frame the depth of your overview accordingly.

It will be helpful to explain that the group may share a range of theological views on some of the less central themes raised. Lovingly disagreeing is healthy and sharpens each other's views. There are 23 chapters in the book. Depending on the length and duration of your study group, you may not be able to cover all the chapters.

You may wish to select certain chapters based on your knowledge and discernment of the group's needs. Conversely, you may choose to use the first meeting to gather requests from the group on which chapters they would like to have covered.

This is where prior knowledge of the material will be helpful. You may need to explain what certain chapters entail (since it may not be clear from the titles alone). You can give an overview of how each meeting will be structured:

- 1. Recap—on the relevant chapter.
- 2. Read—the supporting Scriptures.
- 3. Ask—some key question prompts.
- 4. Point—to further material.
- 5. Pray—thanks for God's revelation.

Note: the key question prompts are designed to create open discussion among the group. They are not exhaustive, and you may wish to explore other avenues as the discussion develops. Worksheets to explore the benefits of a both-and mindset vs an either-or mindset are included and may be tackled ahead of each meeting (or during).

Opportunities can be offered for any group member to use the Guide to lead future meetings.





## You may choose to summarise the danger of having an either-or mentality:

If we drop God's threeness, it results in the demotion of Jesus to a created human being, and the Holy Spirit to merely the tangible 'effect' of God. This, in turn, would nullify our salvation.

If we drop God's oneness, it means that Father, Son and Spirit effectively become three separate Gods, leading to a form of polytheism.

If we sideline holiness, God loses his majesty and wonder—his complete otherness and unfathomable nature is lost on us. A big, big God fills us with awe and enables our response of repentance.







Remind the group that the chapter is using Scripture to provide evidence that both sides of the apparent contradiction are true.

You may choose to summarise the danger of having an either-or mentality:

If we play down God's anger, we neglect the gravity with which God views sin. Consider what it cost God to offer us His mercy—His anger was pointed at Himself, even to death on a cross.

If we play down God's mercy, we end up with a predominantly angry God. It inevitably results in a tireless effort to appease Him and avoid His anger.







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Remind the group that the chapter is using Scripture to provide evidence that both sides of the apparent contradiction are true.

#### You may choose to summarise the danger of having an either-or mentality:

Without understanding that God's common grace prevents our inevitable spiral into depravity, we may not recognise our desperate need for God's saving grace.

Without recognising God's specific saving grace, we may be more inclined to imagine that our own record of goodness somehow influences God's grace to us; or, to believe in universalism (where all are saved).





Neglecting election removes glory from God—from His right to choose us. We may also miss the truth that God electing anyone at all is in itself incredible. He was under no obligation to save us.
